Celebrating the Bicentennial of Thoreau's Birth (1817-2017)

- Terry Tempest Williams, a Utah native and outspoken proponent of public lands, will be our keynote speaker.
- Douglas Brinkley, a presidential historian who has written widely on the conservationist legacies of Theodore and Franklin Roosevelt, will discuss Thoreau's influence in the creation of public lands.
- Christopher Lydon, a Boston-based NPR host, will chair a panel on writing. He will be joined by Dale Peterson, and our friends at PEN New England, who will be awarding the Henry D. Thoreau prize for nature writing during the Gathering.
